


#### What is NationBuilder?

NationBuilder was created with the belief that everyone can lead.


NationBuilder helps building strong relationships that allow moving people to action.







#### What is NationBuilder?

### What is Quorum?

Quorum is a citizen engagement platform and a mobile app.

We equip hundreds of organisations including elected officials, movements, campaigns, ngos but also citizen-driven organisations to help them organize their communities at a local level and use their data to visualise the big picture.








# Civic Tech has a wide range of actors and we have complementary




To reach a wide range of citizens, the key is complementarity and build integrations (APIs) **between solutions**

Use cases: Building a movement from scratch, using data to target areas where participation is weak, empower citizens to take part in local politics, increase voter turnout ahead of an election






# 4 key takeaways & core principles learned from our collective experience





### Distributed network / Network effect



- Maximise 1-1 interactions, proven to be more efficient to build trust
- Distribute leadership and scale the impact of an organisation or campaign
- Civic Tech tools help organise and provide infrastructure to build such networks





## Permanent democracy or "forever democracy"



- Successful initiatives are the ones that never stop engaging with citizens.
- Build relationships. Never stop organising and leading conversations.
   Voting is the beginning of a relationship, not the end.
- Don't leave out those who don't engage but use tech and data to get them involved.





## Meet people where they are







- People are present in different spaces: offline, email, social media, instant messaging - meeting them where they are is the best way to establish a dialogue
- See Digital as a Public Service.
  - The use of civic tech tools can be the first step towards digital for non tech-savvy citizens. And it's an opportunity for everyone.
  - -> Citizen-first and user friendly civic techs





## Build movements and drive change with data



#### It's not about big data

It's not about collecting as much data as possible on people, it's about gathering the necessary amount to know who they are and get them involved.

#### It's about "small data"

Small data exists through permanent democracy and the local level. It helps organisation to answer **quickly** with the relevant information.

#### Privacy by default to build trust

Consent is key - it's crucial to respect how and when people want to be in conversation
